Advent and Holiday Season is upon us...

December 1 marks the first Sunday of Advent. While most of us are caught in the hustle and bustle of the holiday season, it also signals a busy time in the liturgical calendar.

Advent Sundays are December 1, 8, 15 & 22.
Christmas will be celebrated on Christmas

Eve on Tuesday December 24, and Christmas Day, Wednesday, December 25.

St. Stephen's Day, commemorating the patron of our parish, St. Stephen the Martyr, will be Thursday, December 26.

Penitential Devotions are set for Saturday, December 14 at 7 pm, and the YMS of R Semi-annual Egg Sandwich Sale will take place the following Day, Sunday, December 15 after both Masses. The men's group semi-annual sale is a world-famous creation of eggs, ham and cheese on a kaiser roll. It is yummy!

This year we will try to provide pierogi, kielbasa and halushki for sale for your holiday meal plans.

The Season of Advent and the Advent Candles!

The history of Advent is complex. The word "Advent" comes from the Latin word adventus, which means "coming". The season of Advent began in the 4th century as a time to prepare new Christians for baptism at the Feast of Epiphany in January.

Early Christians prepared for baptism through prayer, fasting, and penance over a 40-day period. This period was sometimes called "Lent of St. Martin" because it began on St. Martin's Day on November 11. By the 6th century, Roman Christians associated Advent with the coming of Christ, but not his birth in Bethlehem. It wasn't until the Middle Ages that Advent became explicitly linked to Christmas.

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The "Woody Woodpecker Report" & Other News

The Parish Committee held its monthly meeting Sunday, November 24 in the Fellowship Hall. Here are some of the highlights of that meeting:

Woodpecker Damage: No new damage has been reported on the church and rectory buildings. Kevin reported two new holes need to be repaired, but at least for the time being there are no new signs. Presently, it is not known whether the paint is doing its job or if the woodpeckers are on hiatus. Stay tuned!

✓ RECTORY CHIMNEY REPAIR REOUIRED

In a related matter, during the painting of the rectory it was evident that the chimney needed repair of stucco, etc. An estimate of \$5,800 was received, but other estimates will be accepted in the spring for consideration.

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December Calendar Ushers us into the Holiday Season!

Quantities will be limited and those who volunteer will receive a discount off the price.

This is short notice, but we will try this out and possibly expand on the idea in the future.



Advent is often celebrated with themes of hope, peace, love, and joy. Advent wreaths are traditionally made from evergreen leaves, such as pine or fir, and symbolize God's infinite love. The five candles on an Advent wreath each represent a Christian concept and a theme for each week of Advent:

The Prophet's Candle - The first candle, which is usually purple, symbolizes hope and the anticipation of Christ's coming. It pays homage to the prophets, particularly Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ.

The Bethlehem Candle - The second candle, which is also usually purple, symbolizes peace and preparation. It commemorates Mary and Joseph's journey to Beth-

The Shepherd's Candle - The third candle, which is usually pink, symbolizes joy. It marks the midpoint of Advent on the third Sunday of Advent.

The Angel's Candle - The fourth candle, which is usually purple, symbolizes peace. It marks the final week of Advent and serves as a reminder of the angel's message, "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men" (Luke 2:14).

Christ's Candle - The white candle symbolizes light and purity and is lit on Christmas Day. It represents Christ as being the light of the world.

Advent is the season that leads up to Jesus' birth, starting four Sundays before Christmas and ending on Christmas Day. The dates of Advent change slightly each year.

Advent wreaths are circular and are usually made of evergreen leaves, which represent the hope of eternal life brought by Jesus Christ.

A motion was passed by the Parish Committee to donate \$50 for the purchase of additional items. The Y.M.S. of R. also agreed to donate \$50, as well. Janet requested that project also be promoted in the weekly bulletin to collect donations from members of the parish, also. She stated, "The items will be dropped off at the high school around December 15 or shortly thereafter.

Who was St. Stephen the Martyr?

Stephen is first mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles as one of the Seven Deacons, who were appointed by the Apostles to distribute food and charitable aid to poorer members of the community in the early church.

According to Orthodox belief, he was the eldest and is therefore called "archdeacon."

The reason for the appointment of the deacons is stated to have been dissatisfaction among Hellenistic Jews that their widows were being slighted in prefer-

ence to Hebrew ones in the daily distribution of food.

Since the name Stephanos is Koine Greek, it has been assumed that he was one of these Hellenistic Jews.

Stephen is stated to have been full of faith and the Holy Spirit and to have performed miracles among the people.

It seems to have been among synagogues of Hellenistic Jews that he performed his teachings and "signs and wonders" since it is said that he aroused the opposition of the Synagogue of the Libertines, and "of the Cyrenians, and of the Alexandrians, and of them that were of Cilicia and Asia."

Members of these synagogues challenged Stephen's teachings, but Stephen had bested them in debate. Furious at this humiliation, they suborned false testimony that Stephen had preached blasphemy against Moses and God. They dragged him to appear before the Sanhedrin, the supreme legal court of Jewish elders, accusing him of preaching against the Second Temple and the Torah. Stephen is said to have been unperturbed, his face looking like "that of an angel."

In a long speech to the Sanhedrin comprising almost the whole of Acts 7, Stephen presents his view of the history of the Israelites. The God of glory, he says, appeared to Abraham in Mesopotamia, thus establishing at the beginning of the speech one of its major themes, that God does not dwell only in one particular building (meaning the Temple). Stephen recounts the stories of the patriarchs in some depth and goes into even more detail in the case of Moses. God



appeared to Moses in the burning bush,and inspired Moses to lead his people out of Egypt.

Nevertheless, the Israelites turned to other gods. This establishes the second main theme of Stephen's speech, Israel's disobedience to God. Stephen faced two accusations: that he had declared that Jesus would destroy the Temple in Jerusalem and that he had changed the customs of Moses.

Stephen denounces his listeners as "stiff-necked" people who, just as their ancestors had done, resist the Holy Spirit. "Which of the prophets have not your fathers persecuted? and they have slain them which showed before of the coming of the Just One; of whom ye have been now the betrayers and murderers: who have received the law by the disposition of the angels, and have not kept it.

The stoning of Stephen

The account is that the crowd could contain their anger no longer, and were determined to punish Stephen for his actions. However, Stephen looked up and cried, "Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of Man standing on the right hand of God." He said that the recently resurrected Jesus was standing by the side of God.

The people from the crowd, who threw the first stones, laid their coats down so as to be able to do this, at the feet of a young man named Saul (later identified as Paul the Apostle).

Stephen prayed that the Lord would receive his spirit and his killers be forgiven, sank to his knees, and "fell asleep."

Saul "was consenting unto his death." In the aftermath of Stephen's death, the remaining

disciples except for the apostles fled to distant lands, many to Antioch.

Location of the martyrdom of Stephen

The exact site of Stephen's stoning is not mentioned in Acts; instead there are two different traditions. One, claimed by noted French archaeologists Louis-

Hugues Vincent (1872–1960) and Félix-Marie Abel (1878–1953) to be ancient, places the event at Jerusalem's northern gate, while another one, dated by Vincent and Abel to the Middle Ages and no earlier than the 12th century, locates it at the eastern gate. St. Stephen was the first Christian martyr of the early church.

The association of Stephen with our parish

According the history of our congregation, when the parish was first established, many parishioners from other churches in Reading treated the organizers of this new PNCC house of worship badly. There was namecalling, street fights and even stone-throwing.

Due to this turbulent response from the community, Fr. Cybulski, the first pastor, suggested the name of St. Stephen the Martyr, when the original parish committee sought for an appropriate name for the church.

Fr. Sr. Edward Ratajack, visited the site of the eastern gate, on a trip to the Holy Land, and brought back with him a stone from the place where it is said his martyrdom took place. That stone is on the table beside the St. Stephen statue in the front of the church.

We encourage you to celebrate the feast of St. Stephen, December 26, pause for a moment to reflect on his holy life, and remember the founders of our parish!
